TOO MUCH INFORMATION!

There is a common expression: "Too much information!" We usually use it when people tell us details about their lives that we don't want or need to know. Today, when James and John ask Jesus a simple question, making their request for places of honor in the kingdom, a simple answer might have been in order. Instead, as he often does, Jesus answers a question with a question; today it's about drinking the cup of suffering. Then, once the others are indignant over James and John's outrageous request, he proceeds to give them what may have been "too much information" for followers who were simply interested in the pursuit of glory. But this information, though it can sometimes seem "too much" for us, is essential for our lives as disciples. In Isaiah, in Hebrews, and in Mark today, we learn this information. It is in suffering, in weakness, in self-giving service to others, that we come to understand the kingdom. It is the information we need to find our place and come to be honored in the reign of God.

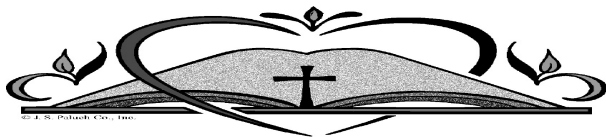

Ci to mają plecy

Często, kiedy myślimy o „świętych”, wydaje nam się, że są to herosi, postacie wręcz półmitologiczne, osoby, których absolutnie nie mamy szans doścignąć w ich świętości. Przeciwnicy kultu świętych, będą mówić, że tak naprawdę chrześcijańscy święci zastąpili pogańskie panteony rozlicznych bóstw. Jaka jest prawda?

W człowieku jest potrzeba czci i szacunku do starszych i pamięci o zmarłych. Paganie często tych zmarłych, choćby cesarzy rzymskich deifikowali, to znaczy po śmierci włączali w panteon bóstw uznając ich za synów bożych. Jednak święci, nie są odrębnymi bogami na równi z Ojcem, Synem i Duchem Świętym. Są tymi, którzy się do nich zbliżyli. Są tacy jak my. Z krwi i kości. I z tych dwóch powodów ich potrzebujemy: po pierwsze, są blisko Boga w niebie, i mają większe „plecy” niż my, dlatego ich wzywamy, a po drugie są wzorem do naśladowania. Ale spróbujmy się zastanowić: skąd w Kościele wziął się kult świętych? Czy on jest wciąż aktualny?

Chrześcijanie od początku prześladowań, z ogromnym szacunkiem odnosili się do tych, którzy oddali życie za Jezusa. Przeczytać o tym można już w Dziejach Apostolskich, gdy mowa o śmierci diakona Szczepana (Dz 7, 54). Chrześcijanie upamiętniali dni śmierci tych, którzy oddali życie za Chrystusa i nazywali je „dniami narodzin dla nieba”. Pisemne świadectwo tej praktyki znaleźć można w opisie śmierci św. Polikarpa. Chrześcijanie mówią: „będziemy się tam w miarę możliwości stale gromadzić w dzień jego męczeńskich narodzin”. Do dziś w Kościele wspomnienia świętych zazwyczaj są obchodzone w dniu śmierci poszczególnych postaci. Oprócz wspomnienia czasu, wspomniano miejsce męczeństwa: na grobach pierwszych męczenników sprawowano Eucharystię, tam budowano kaplicę na grobach męczenników (patrz: Watykan). Z tego zwyczaju odprawiania na grobach świętych wzięła się tradycja, umieszczania relikwii świętych w ołtarzach. Odwołuje się ona do Apokalipsy, wedle której pod ołtarzem w niebie umieszczone są ciała świętych (Ap 6, 9).

W naszym kościele również mamy relikwie: św. Jacka—przy jego figurze oraz św. Faustyny, w kaplicy przy obrazie Jezusa Miłosiernego.
