LOVE ONE ANOTHER

In the Gospel for the Sixth Sunday of Easter we are met with an extraordinary challenge: Jesus commands us to “love one another as I love you” (John 15:12). The letter from John echoes this command. Of course, we are to love those in our family, those we work with, those we like. But the scriptures make clear that we are also to love those we never notice, those we purposely avoid, and even those we are tempted to despise. In this Sunday's selection from the Acts of the Apostles Peter shows us how far God's love extends, and how far our love should extend in response. Peter realizes that God no longer “shows partiality” to the Jews, sharing divine love exclusively with them. Christ has revealed that God's love extends to all people, and so should ours.

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MISSION STATEMENT ~ Ascension Thursday

Thursday we celebrate Christ's ascension into heaven and his commissioning of the disciples to carry on his mission in the world. First we hear Luke's description of those events in the opening verses of the Acts of the Apostles. Next we hear words of encouragement and guidance from the Letter to the Ephesians.

Finally we hear Mark's account of the Ascension, foretelling the mighty words and acts the Christian community would do in Jesus' name. Together these scriptures give us a vision of the mission of the church of Jesus Christ—a mission statement of sorts. Like mission statements in our parishes and corporations, this mission statement can help us set priorities and focus our activities. It can guide and support us as we strive to continue Christ's messianic mission on earth.

Czy grób Jezusa był pusty? /6/

Przyjmując dodatkowo, że wierzchnią tkaniną grobową, umieszczoną na Całunie Turyńskim w miejscu twarzy Jezusa, była Chusta z Manoppello, możemy wyobrazić sobie wrażenie, jakie widok oblicza żyjącego Pana mógł wyrzucić na pogrążonym w żałobie umiłowanym uczniu. Słynna chusta „owinięta w jedynej pozycji” wyróżniałaby się nie tylko niepowtarzalnym sposobem ułożenia w kształcie głowy, ale także obecnością wizerunku, pozostawionego tam jako niezaprzeczalny dowód zmartwychwstania Chrystusa. Czy właśnie dlatego Jan, gdy tylko to *ujrzał*, bez cienia wątpliwości *uwierzył*? Zostawiając na boku liczne badania naukowe dotyczące tkanin z Turynu i z Manoppello, warto podkreślić, że póki co nie istnieją zadowalające dowody czysto ludzkiego pochodzenia obu relikwii. Istotnie, oba wizerunki uznawane są powszechnie za *acheiropoiëtoi*, czyli „nie ręką ludzką uczynione”.

Wracając do perspektywy biblijnej, należy ponownie stwierdzić, że chociaż opisy ewangeliczne nie dowodzą wprost autentyczności wspomnianych relikwii, niemniej jednak jej nie wykluczają. Pewne cechy tych tajemniczych wizerunków zdają się wręcz zaskakująco trafnie tłumaczyć i uzupełniać to, czego sam tekst natchniony bezpośrednio nie wyjaśnia. Jednak o obecności w Grobie Pańskim w ów wielkanocny poranek Chusty z Oviedo, Całunu Turyńskiego czy Chusty z Manoppello prawdopodobnie w sposób ostateczny nigdy się nie dowiemy.

Albowiem zmartwychwstanie Chrystusa nie jest rzeczywistością dostrzegalną oczyma ciała, lecz pozostaje tajemnicą naszej wiary. Piotr także był obecny w grobie, ale tylko o Janie napisano, że *uwierzył*. Może zatem nie chodzi tu o zwykłe ludzkie widzenie, ale o takie, które dokonuje się jedynie w sercu umiłowanego ucznia. Ono dostępne jest przez wiarę także nam. Również dziś zmartwychwstały Pan kieruje do wszystkich swych uczniów paschalne zaproszenie: *Błogosławieni, którzy nie widzieli, a uwierzyli* (J 20,29).
